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Dear Friends

Yesterday's weather forecast for the week October 14-31 was gloomy. A deep depression would bring much rain and strong winds, followed by the relics of hurricane Epsilon and more threats of fleeting sunshine and very changeable weather. It seemed to reflect the character of life in the church family and in society in general.

There have been moments of brightness in Stowe Parish Church life: the coffee morning, the Bible studies, the Prayer Cells, Val's helpful Westfield talks, thanks to Zoom and the three or four services in a Covid secure

Church! Yet there is the looming threat of changes: the curtailment of Christmas celebrations, a long hard winter of rising infections, deaths, tightening restrictions and, lastly, economic hardships. More immediately, we have suffered the loss of Pat, Val's ill health and the independent report about Peter's death, which, though suggesting ways to avoid a repetition, raked over old hurts and sadnesses

How are we to respond? Firstly, as Paul wrote in Ephesians 2: 20, we should be "always giving thanks to God the Father for everything in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ." EVERYTHING-surely not! This may seem incredibly hard and even impossible. It's not even my second or third reaction, if trouble hits. A grumble or a moan or a bleat about life being so difficult usually comes first. On the other hand, if God is our Father, who loves us, He will surely in His mighty power see us through the tribulation. Indeed, thanksgiving can lighten the burden, as our gaze is turned away from ourselves to the grace and generous nature of our Lord. As the song goes, "Turn your eyes upon Jesus, look full in His wonderful face and the things of earth will grow strangely dim in the light of His glory and grace."

Secondly, in the moment of crisis, we can recall Psalm 94: 18-19, "When I said 'my foot is slipping', your love, O Lord, supported me. When anxiety was great within me, your consolation brought joy to my heart." The Psalmist is quite open and honest with the Lord and does not hide his anxiety, in case it reflects badly on his spiritual state. He comes clean about his foot slipping and all his concerns. As someone said, the Lord can handle these things with love and joy.

Thirdly, there is the encouragement from Jude v. 1 when he reminds us of the promise that as believers we "have been called....loved by the Father and KEPT by Jesus Christ." In a way, he sums up the previous two points.

As the Archdeacon of Oxford stressed, when he spoke at the communion service on October 25th, part of this keeping process involves the Lord's words "Peace I leave with you: My peace I GIVE to you." Jn. 14: 27.

I have one of those little diamonds (plastics beads) on my study windowsill from one such story and as I looked at it today glinting in the sunlight I realised that the best way to remember her is just like this, full of light, showing the beauty of God from every angle! You will each have your own thoughts and memories to ponder over in the days to come, but for me I will always remain mindful of the utter privilege of working together, being alongside her and receiving her ministry as a priestly colleague, a wise counsellor and good friend.

This week I have chosen to dedicate my service and sermon to her, especially as she was a great fan of telling me and others not to worry when things got too tough, but instead to put it in the hands God!

As we prepare to settle into the new normal across the country and our normal now at Stowe, we must do so in the knowledge that we will overcome.... because this is our song of faith!

Worrying is the way of the world; Freedom is the way of the Father!

Parish Council Update

DADFORD TRAFFIC CALMING -Every household in Dadford should have received a letter by now, informing you that MEPC Silverstone GP Ltd will be beginning the traffic calming works within the village from Monday 9th November. These works were part of the section 106 obligations and are expected to take 6 weeks. We are very relieved and grateful that this is now happening, thank you MEPC. If you didn't receive your letter then you can find a copy on www.stowepc.uk. On the subject of traffic, our thanks also go to the police for sending out the speed camera on many occasions recently and hopefully once the traffic calming is completed the speed will slow down through the village.

We are extremely happy with the way all the improvements made to the allotment/playing field area over the last few months are looking. The playground area is now finished with newly painted, bright coloured equipment and new tarmac. It is nice to see it being well used since the reopening and we are glad it is being enjoyed. It is complemented by the renewed fencing that was

replaced earlier in the year and the high standard of grass cutting that we have had this season, along with the allotments that have been looking fantastic this year. Well done to all the allotment holders. It makes such a difference to the Village and we are immensely touched by all the positive comments and feedback that we have received.

The main thing that has happened since the last edition, which we are sure has not gone unnoticed, is the vast amount of work carried out by dredging the brook and clearing the pond. There have been some selfset trees removed that were blocking parts of the brook as well as intermingling with Dadford's notorious Weeping Ash trees. The hope is that this will assist with the flooding if the brook can run freely. This was put to the test just a few days after finishing the works when we had a huge downpour of rain and we are happy to report that the water did not burst the banks despite other local areas being severely affected. This work was carried out due to the immense generosity of Paul Wheeler arranging for this to be done for us, for which we are hugely grateful. Massive thanks go to Paul for doing this for the village, and our thanks to Steve (the digger driver) for doing such a fantastic job.

Some clearing up has started with a group of councillors and helpful parishioners getting together clearing the dead wood. In the Spring the area will be power harrowed and then re seeded, so that by early summer it should be looking lovely, with the brook being both a functional and visual asset for the village.

Christmas Crumble Recipe (from Ivy)

2 large cooking apples 175g mincemeat (approx) 115g plain flour 50g wholemeal flour 80g butter 81g caster sugar



Sift flours and rub in the butter, then add sugar.

Peel core and slice apples and mix with the mincemeat, adding a little sugar if apples are very tart. Place apple mixture into an ovenproof dish and immediately cover with crumble mix, pressing down lightly. Cook at Gas Mark 5 190' C for approximately 45 minutes until lightly browned.

In line with diocesan recommendations, we will re-introduce services in church slowly and, of course, with all the Covid-19 safety measures in place.

Those who **wish to come to a service** will need to **book their place** in advance as there will be greatly reduced seating due to social distancing regulations.

Bookings can be made in the week before the service by contacting Tamara Kimpton (01280 814456) when details will be taken in line with the test and trace system. *Masks must be worn* at all times in the church and seats will be allocated on arrival. People are asked to *maintain the 2-metre* rule while waiting to enter and to move straight away from the church when they leave. An offering will not be taken during the service, although it can be placed on a plate at the back of church as you enter or leave. People are also asked to *use hand sanitiser on entering and leaving the church*.

As part of the Stowe School safety measures in place, everyone coming to church will have their temperature checked as they come past the security cabin.

Journey to Nepal!

I am delighted to be able to share with you some of the highlights when I travelled to Nepal as a volunteer with Christians Abroad. My journey really started in Lillingstone Lovell in 2008 when I went on an Alpha course. The penny dropped and I realised God has a purpose and plan for all of us. I began volunteering 10 years ago and went



to Albania helping in a kids' camp and then when I got the opportunity again, I went to Cambodia helping very poor women start a small business to generate an income. Volunteering makes a real difference to your life; you experience poverty and need which makes you so grateful for what you have. It made me energised to take on another project but where? I prayed and let God guide me and found myself en route to Nepal in Jan 2019.

Nepal is a landlocked country in South Asia, lying between China and India. The streets of Kathmandu are clogged with traffic and studded with ancient temples. Exquisite woodcarvings dating back centuries adorn buildings that are falling down. It is third world; in 1998 - 2006 an internal revolution killed thousands of people and in 2015 the country was badly hit by an earthquake. The government is secular but aspires to the Hindu stronghold. 80%+ are Hindu, 10% Buddhist and 2% Christian. Many Christians are persecuted.

I stayed in Kathmandu with a Hindu family and I started work with a small NGO called RUWON, which focused on women's rights helping poor women and children in rural Nepal. They also had a children's orphanage. I helped them in the office with grant proposals, their website and anything else that came my way. I soon realised everything was not at all what it seemed. The company was barely functioning, with lack of staff and expertise and I discovered the main funding for the orphanage had ceased and it was reaching a crisis. Where to house the children?, how to pay school fees? and pay off the credit for food and supplies. Each day faced new problems but I would not have missed it for anything. I immersed myself in the culture of Nepal, was challenged both mentally and physically but enjoyed every minute, just accepting things as they happened. Each day I felt God guiding me, and each time a problem arrived I just waited and listened and knew a solution would follow.

When I was in Nepal, I connected with another project that 'Christians Abroad. (the company I had volunteered with) was supporting. I met Pastor David and his wife Mariya who ran a Christian orphanage, had started the local Christian church and helped in the local community. On walking into the children's home. I had a strong sense that this was where I should be working and it was what God had called me to do. I kept in contact with them through the summer of 2019 and went back to Nepal in October 2019 to stay with them and learn more about the work they did. This time, unlike before, doors started to open. I soon got to know all the children, we studied together, ate together shared Bible study and went to the local church on Saturdays and met local families. David and I then started to put plans together for my stay. We had plans to start a sewing centre and visits to the Chitwan jungle area and a Christian community in the lower Himalayas. I shall briefly tell you about the sewing project. A small charity in Scotland had promised some money to start a sewing training centre in Kathmandu. This was so very poor women could learn to sew and tailor clothes and then hopefully start a small business making clothes for other people.

During my stay, we were able to find a place for the training, buy the machines, find a teacher and get the project up and running. The women are all doing really well and made lots of progress and hopefully soon will be able to have their own sewing machines. This is just a start for the many plans we have to help widows and orphans in Nepal. Lock down has curtailed me getting out this year, but we continue to have regular contact via Zoom to keep things going. The big problem now in Nepal is a shortage of food, as lockdown has prevented working and the families have no savings to fall back on, and no government support.

Stay Safe, Loreen



When I first read of tree migration, into my mind came the Huorns in the Lord of the Rings who were somewhere between trees and Ents and could and did move to defeat the Orcs in a battle.

Macbeth thought he was safe since Birnam Wood could not possibly move till he saw the 'trees' moving towards his fortress. Tree migration, as I read, was neither of these and refers to what happens in woods and forests where many trees have been growing perhaps for hundreds and even thousands of years and what happens when the area is affected by climate change. Changes in temperature and humidity may result in trees being unable to cope and new saplings will not grow. This means that the value of trees in carbon sequestering is negatively affected as is soil health, water quality and nutrients. It may be that new areas become hospitable to them when they can be said to migrate but there has to be space for them too. These new areas may be too far away for natural seed dispersal. For trees that grow and reproduce very slowly migration is a huge challenge. A shifting forest composition could have a drastic impact on the region's carbon storage capacity. Additionally, when large populations of trees are lost the complex forest ecosystem can break down. Meanwhile invasive trees may replace them in their original forests and woods which may not be as effective and it's likely that a monoculture will develop and diversity lost.

Many people are concerned about human migration, seeing it only as a threat. When huge areas of countries become uninhabitable for people as well as trees there will be huge numbers of people forced to migrate though their responsibilities for climate change are way behind ours. There are migrants in Asian countries from Indonesia, Bangladesh, Nepal, living under tarpaulins with no rights and working to produce palm oil in the quantities demanded by Western lifestyles. Migration has always been part of the human condition ever since we left the Rift Valley and spread out into the plains of Africa and beyond. We know that God has concern for aliens. 'Do not ill-treat an alien or oppress him, for you were aliens in Egypt." [Exodus 22 v 21]. Jesus reminds us that what we do or do not do to the stranger we do or do not do to Him. If we fail to help the stranger we are cursed. [Matthew 25 v 35 and 43.] The writer of the letter to the Hebrews reminds us not to forget to entertain strangers and Peter underlines the fact that we are all strangers on this earth; that our true home is in heaven. We must take steps to prevent climate change destroying forests and we must take steps to welcome the stranger who comes with His message in this season of Advent and Christmas.
