Whilst, at the time of writing it is unclear what procedures will still need to be in place, pupils and staff safety remains uppermost in our planning. However, we all look forward to a, hopefully, more 'normal' academic year and all the excitement, learning and opportunities that lie ahead!



Parish Council Update

We are pleased to confirm that following ongoing feedback and dialogue with the MEPC and the Parish Council, there will be additional traffic calming works completed at the North End entrance to the village. There has been detailed discussion concerning where the additional works should be completed and what can be provided (bearing in mind that we are always working within parameters set by Highways) in order to make our village a safer place to live. We will of course share these plans with you when they have been finalised.

Hopefully you will notice that the village will soon look a little brighter at night with the imminent implementation of new LED street lighting, this is a far more efficient and sustainable use of electricity for the benefit of all villagers. As the evenings start to draw in we hope that this will contribute to a safer environment for us all.

The parish council takes an interest in all aspects of the village and we are currently investigating options that may be available to us to continue to improve the footpath through the allotments to allow easier access for all villagers. We shall of course keep you informed of any developments.

We hope you are all enjoying the wonderful views that Dadford offers and agree that it is looking especially smart due to the more regular grass maintenance service.

Sadly, we have had a recent spate of thefts in the village, the use of the Dadford Village Facebook page has proven invaluable in allowing us to encourage all villagers to remain vigilant and share any relevant information. Please continue to remain vigilant and ensure that any suspicious behaviour is reported to **Thames Valley Police by calling 101** or online, the community police officer who visited the village recently stressed that this type of information can be extremely useful in preventing or solving crime.



Now that Covid restrictions are easing you might be planning to hold a well-overdue party. If so, you may wish to consider hiring the village hall which has been recently refurbished. There is a large central hall with black-out blinds and hearing loop, fully equipped kitchen, accessible toilet and disabled access. With full central heating and 'bags' of character, the hall comfortably accommodates up to 80 people seated auditorium-style or 60 people seated at rectangular tables.

In addition, the hall caters for many different types of events – exhibitions, craft fairs, weddings, wakes, film nights, speaker series, fund raising, art and photographic clubs, sport and fitness, fun and friendship.

The costs are extremely reasonable at £8.00 per hour for commercial events and £50.00 deposit or £4.00 per hour and £20.00 deposit for non-commercial events booked by residents of Stowe parish. Payable in advance by cheque (please allow two weeks to clear before the event) or bank transfer. If you would like to make a booking, please email Sue Boulet: **sueboulet@stowepc.uk**

Just a reminder that new signage has been erected in the parish hall car park. Please can we ask that it is used for patrons of the village hall, the residents of the Old School House and for parish council



business only. Failure to observe this polite and reasonable request will regrettably leave us no alternative but to introduce additional parking restrictions.

Harvest Mark 6, 25 – 33 Learning from the birds

"Take a good look at the fields. The crops are now ripe and ready to harvest," said Jesus. Food for people, animals, birds. Who sent the water? Who sent the sunshine? Who sent the wind? Who provides the basic needs of all His creatures?

So why are we worried about what we shall eat, what we shall drink or what we shall wear? Jesus has reassuring words for us: God knows our needs. Look at His provision for birds who might be considered of less value than ourselves. If we, like Jesus, are concerned foremost with living according to the Kingdom of God and following His pattern in our lives, then food and drink and clothing would look after themselves. We ask for "daily bread" trusting that God knows already what we need before we ask.

We worry about our material security. Jesus wants us to simplify our lives, to look beyond ourselves and our self-centred perspective and seek the joy, contentment and purpose of living in the Kingdom.

In the past couple of years the amount of wildlife has increased drastically in and around the village. Fantastic you might think, but is it really?

Firstly, there is 'Hettie' the Heron, who is a regular visitor to fishponds around the village, helping herself to valuable koi carp and goldfish alike, not taking into account the overall cost to the fishkeeper. And before you say why don't you I can assure you that all the gadgets and gizmos, the plastic heron, the floating sphere, the motion activated water squirter etc DO NOT WORK.



The little egret is also seen regularly feeding in the brook through the village.

The next regular visitor is 'Billy' badger, who makes a nuisance of himself by emptying the food waste bins. Residents in the High Street have come up with numerous ingenious ways to keep the bins out of reach. 'Billy' and 'Molly' the muntjac are regular visitors to the allotments helping themselves to the delicious fresh offerings such as sweet corn, a big favourite, broad beans and peas, along with some raspberries. Again, allotment holders have come up with fences to deter the intruders, but this doesn't stop the birds flying in for their pick of the fruit bushes.

We also have underground intruders all over the heartland and in gardens alike, namely, 'Mervin' the mole and all his cousins, leaving their telltale heaps of soil everywhere. Another underground dweller is 'Roger' rabbit who is putting in an appearance in a few gardens.

Other visitors, much maligned, are the grass snakes and the adders, both of which are getting more prevalent. If you have a pond then the grass snake will inevitably turn up at some point especially if there are also frogs in situ!

Of course if we look up there are Red Tailed Kites, Buzzards and even a Raven or two.

How many of these would you have seen ten or twenty years ago?
