Dear Friends,

"That was the year, that was. It's over. Let it go."

Not quite what Millicent Martin sang on TV in 1962-63 but it expresses what perhaps we all feel now. Let go of all the anxiety and despair, the uncertainty and unhappiness, of all that happened to us, our families and our country. What comes next?

Voltaire had some sensible, practical advice: "Cultivate your garden," give yourself a project.

A garden is a useful metaphor for thinking about our own plot, what and how we are going to grow to fulfil God's project for us. We need a Handbook for a good start and the Bible is full of wise, encouraging words. By reading the Bible daily we prepare the ground for the good seed to find the right conditions to grow. We dig the soil by turning to the Bible to find helpful advice about growth and nurture and perseverance and we plant the seeds in our hearts and minds. Then we mulch with the wisdom of many writers and thinkers. We pray for wind and weather to nourish the seeds into growth and strengthen that growth in Bible studies and prayer cells, sharing experiences and deepening understanding. We reflect on our life and weed out what is wrong to give space and light to the good and noble.

Jesus, a country man, knew about sowing and reaping, growth and failure, temptation and success. He told many vivid stories to illustrate the importance of cultivating a garden: for example Luke 13, 6-9; Matthew 13, 1-23. The greatest gardener is God. "I am the true vine," said Jesus, "and My Father is the gardener," John 15,1.

There was a craze for autograph books when I was a child and this entry has influenced my life. I hope you find it helpful too:

"I expect to pass through this world but once; any good thing therefore that I can do, or any kindness that I can show to any fellow-creature, let me do it now, let me not defer or neglect it, for I shall not pass this way again."

Their quarrels reached such a pitch that Abram sought to make peace between them by offering Lot the choice of where they and their animals should live. "If you go to the left, I'll go to the right; if you go to the right, I'll go to the left."

Lot looked up and saw the whole plain of the Jordan, well watered like the Garden of Eden, and chose that for himself. He set off east while Abram stayed in the hills. Lot selfishly saw the advantages of moving and increasing his wealth.

Abram resolved their differences with his generous offer, relying on God's blessing for his future.

Jesus said, "Give to everyone who asks you, and if anyone takes what belongs to you, do not demand it back. Do to others as you would have them do to you." (Luke 6, 29).

Have you ever had to make the peace? What does it ask of you? Here is a prayer to help you:

News from Nepal

2021 has been a year of coping with lockdown covid restrictions and then the move back to more normality. Nepal was hit badly in May in Kathmandu by the Delta variant, and they gradually started coming out of lockdown in August with all restrictions lifted in October. Travel to Nepal opened mid-November as they came off the red list.

We now pray and hope for a better 2022. We have two volunteers being sent out, via Christians Abroad, to stay with Pastor David and his wife Maryia and help in the children's home in Kathmandu. Janina and Isabella are both 19 years old Christians and have been planning this trip all year. They have both been working hard to save money, and now have visas and tickets booked for the new year and plan to be in Nepal for three to four months. Janina and Isabella are both very talented students. Janina hopes to be able to teach the children how to make Jewellery and Isabella is very good at music and singing. They will also be teaching conversational English at a local School. Their trip will also involve travelling to other more rural communities in Nepal, experiencing the culture and helping local families.

Given the current circumstances with the new Omnicom variant we ask for your prayers that they can both get out to Nepal.

The sewing ladies have continued with their training after lockdown, and 4 of them will be ready to start their own business in the new year. Pastor David continues to spread the gospel and last week planted a new church in the Chitwan area. He asks for your prayers that many will come to Jesus.
